Covid Catch up and the Importance of Attendance and Punctuality

With the disruptions due to covid over the past two years, it has been a focus for teachers to catch up and plug the gaps in children's learning. Children in Y3 have not had a normal education since they were in Reception. Children in Y6 who we are preparing for secondary school have not had a full school-based education since year 3.

Some of the things we have put in place for the children to 'catch up' include:

- Purchase of curriculum resources and materials that support children to get back on track. (These include CGP books for maths and spelling and grammar and a catch-up reading programme).
- Additional interventions (funding additional staff to develop outcomes for children who have been identified as needing 'catch up' in their learning.)
- Specialist support and staff training for accelerated progress for Writing and Maths.

curriculum is in place across all classes and relies on children being in every day and on time.

- Reading initiatives such as SPARK reading initiative, updates to the class and school library and the storytelling competition.
- Assessment materials for Reading and Maths to identify gaps in learning and to support with learning progress.

 The school is aware that the extent of missed learning will mean that a rigorous long-term process needs to be in place to support the children to plug the gaps over time. This will be a paced programme rather than a 'quick fix' approach. As such, it is especially important that we maintain good levels of attendance and punctuality. Early morning work before registration supports the targeted needs of each class and some of the group interventions happen during this time. A carefully planned

While we are aware of the issues around covid and keeping children safe at school, it is apparent that there are an increasing number of absences that could be avoided such as taking additional holiday time or parents keeping children home unnecessarily because of proximity to covid. We kindly ask for your support in helping us to limit further disruption to learning.

Reading is a key focus and we hope that your child's reading diary is a useful tool for you to support their reading at home.

Calling all STEM Parents

At Trafalgar, we provide children with lots of hands-on experiences to promote their love of science and confidence in working scientifically. Research shows that when parents play an active role, children achieve greater success as learners. For British Science Week 2022 (11th - 20th March, theme: Growth), we are encouraging an understanding of how science links to various jobs in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). To help us, we would be really grateful if any parents or relatives working in STEM careers would create a short video to explain and promote their work. The video should be around 3 minutes and cover the following:

- · Who are you? What is your STEM job?
- · Who/what influenced your decision to have a STEM career?
- · What does your job involve? (To capture the children's interest, you may want to include a short section of your working environment and/or you working in your environment.)
- · What type of person do you need to be to do your job? Why do you enjoy your job?

Please upload your footage to your 'my documents folder' on j2e and then let your child's class teacher know. We look forward to receiving a range of inspiring STEM videos, by Friday 4th March, 2022, which we will share with the children in the hope we can build the children's sense that science can lead to a wide range of really fascinating careers.

What a busy half term we have had! Through our topic of Machines we have learnt so much.








In Art we have studied the sculptor Anthony Gormley focusing on 'The Angel of the North'.




We have made and been using maps to follow the route to Kneller gardens to observe the changes in our local area from Autumn to Winter.




The children also explored the animals that would live in these countries and how they have adapted to live in different conditions.






We used the data that we collected on our bird walk to create a bar graph in Maths.

The theme of this year's Safer Internet Day was Respect












Infants

We also used drama to explore how the different zones might look.












The aim of the competition is for pupils to write a poem based on the cover or title of one of the books we will be reading. The covers of these books can be seen below and more information on the books can be found here.

A big thank you to our many parent helpers who come in to hear readers and deliver class. library sessions.
















In assembly on Monday, we refreshed our memories on the Zones of Regulation and have been talking about how all feelings are valid feelings and that it is okay to feel them. We have discussed the effect that different feelings have on our body and mind and have been creating a tool kit of strategies, that work for us, to help us move back to the 'Green Zone' as that's when we are 'Good to Go'.



Safer Internet Day Juniors

We spend a lot of time discussing how to stay safe online and what to do in different situations that make us feel uneasy or uncomfortable.

Safer Internet Day's focus is year is 'All fun and games' so we have been looking at staying safe while playing online games. We discovered that many of us play online games so, we have been focusing on how we can stay respectful online and discussing how our words can affect others. We spoke about, that even if you type words on a game or in a chat message, it is the same as you saying these words, and they can still hurt people's feelings. We have also been looking at what we can do if we see something that upsets us, or if someone isn't respectful towards us, when we are online. The children have had some great ideas and responses to this- so ask your children what they would do!





