As we approach the final summer term, it is good to reflect on our achievements and successes this year so far. With 2 good OFSTED in the bag, we are continuing to focus on our aims for the year.

A lot of work has gone into supporting reading. With the help of the PTA in providing reading resources and library books, we have made great progress. The phonics scheme has supported our early readers with developing their decoding skills and as they progress through school, the resources are in place to support with reading fluency and comprehension skills.

Our children have also been working hard to develop their handwriting and spelling skills to support their writing across the curriculum. You will have seen evidence of their progress in the books which were available at the parents' meetings this term.

Inspiring curriculum learning has been evident across all subjects and there have been many enrichment opportunities including Great Fire of London workshops, topic-based assemblies, school visits to a local Church, the Apiary visit etc. This term we have had whole school events such as International Week, World Book Day, Red Nose Day and International Women's Day. This term, governors have been back to business as usual, carrying out visits with a particular focus on Maths, Writing, Computing and Early Years.



In English we focused on the books 'A Walk in London' and 'Zeraffa Giraffa' We spent lots of time working on our brochures that have information on all the best London Landmarks.










In English and History, we have been learning about the Great Fire of London. We enjoyed attending the drama workshop to help us understand the events and it provided us with an immersive experience. The children created detailed non-chronological reports that demonstrated their understanding of the events in 1666. We then used this knowledge in writing diary entries from Vlad the flea's perspective.



In RE, our topic question has been, 'Does art teach us about religion?' We have really enjoyed exploring different art forms across a range of religions and we have had lots of opportunities to create some of our own art based on what we have learnt.















In science we have been finding out and learning to describe how plants need water, light and a suitable temperature to grow and stay healthy. We carried out an investigation to find out if beans would grow in any other medium besides soil. The results were fascinating!

The children have enjoyed an action-packed half-term and we are all so proud of them. We are seeing such great progress in all subject areas, due to the hard work of all involved. Wishing you all a well-deserved break and we look forward to all the fun that the summer terms will bring!

In Science, we have been learning all about plants, starting with identifying and describing the functions of different parts of the plant, exploring the requirements of different plants, in different conditions. We have really enjoyed the practical experiments and are looking forward to our trip to Kew Gardens next half term!

In Maths, we have been learning all about numerators, denominators and equivalent fractions. We learnt that the bigger the denominator the smaller the fraction. As a mental reminder we've been thinking about chocolate, cakes and pizza! We decided half a bar of chocolate was better than an eighth!




We've also been looking at measuring mass, and capacity and understanding equivalent measurements, this meant we had to think about divisions all the way up to 1000.

Year 4 have had a fantastic half term! We have learnt about different topics across all our curriculum. Here's a snippet of our Spring 2 half term's learning:

In Geography we have been exploring and researching South America. We have looked at the physical and human features of Brazil, compared the temperature and precipitation of Manaus and London and we have used Oddizzi to help down our enquiry skills.

In Science we have been learning all about teeth and digestion. We had a nurse visit to discuss oral hygiene, compared the teeth of different animals and discussed why they might be different dependent on whether they were a carnivore, herbivore or omnivore. We even got hands-on recreating the journey of food through the human digestive system.

In D&T we have been adapting our own biscuit recipes. We experimented with flavours and textures by adding & substituting ingredients. All to impress the taste testers who judged our final products.

















Our **English** text this half-term has been Shakespeare's *Macbeth*. The children have explored the rich language, analysed the characters and written letters in role.
